VA Boston Healthcare System (VABHS) offers two PGY-1 residency programs: one with focus in Ambulatory Care (5 positions) and another with focus in Acute Care (2 positions). Residents in either track have the option to spend up to three months in the other practice setting. The two PGY-1 programs have separate match numbers and applicants can apply to one or both programs.

The Ambulatory Care program is split into four twelve-week blocks. During the Ambulatory Care blocks, residents will be exposed to Primary Care, Anticoagulation, and other elective clinics. The Acute Care program is split into twelve four-week blocks. Four week experiences include general medicine, emergency medicine, infectious disease, acute care cardiology, medical intensive care, and cardiac surgery.

Residents are exposed to a wide variety of additional experiences and opportunities. Some of these include participation in the VABHS P&T, Quality Management and Newsletter committees. Opportunities to design and deliver presentations for ACPE Continuing Education credit are available. VABHS has strong relationships that provide teaching opportunities with the two pharmacy schools in Boston: Northeastern University and Massachusetts College of Pharmacy.

A large emphasis is placed on resident research projects. Each resident is paired with a project preceptor with research experience to mentor them through the process. In addition, an experienced Research & Development Committee and statistician are available for guidance. Residents are also responsible for obtaining IRB approval and applying for grants to aid in project funding. Research projects are presented at ASHP Midyear Clinical Meeting and Eastern States Conference for Residents and Preceptors.

About the VA Boston Healthcare System

VA Boston Healthcare System (VABHS) exists to serve the veteran through the delivery of timely quality care by staff who demonstrate outstanding customer service, the advancement of health care through research, and the education of tomorrow's health care providers.

The VABHS consists of three campuses: Jamaica Plain, West Roxbury and Brockton, where pharmacists are responsible for providing pharmaceutical care in a variety of Ambulatory Care and Inpatient settings. Clinical Pharmacy Specialists (CPS) are actively involved in the management of patients with various disease states and work closely with other health care professionals.

CPS at the VABHS have prescriptive privileges under the supervision of an attending physician.

Qualifications for Application:

1. Citizen of the United States.
2. Must obtain a Doctor of Pharmacy degree from an accredited college of Pharmacy or be eligible for graduation before July 1.
3. Eligible for pharmacist licensure in any US state before September 1.

Required Application Materials:

1. Curriculum Vitae
2. Official transcript sent from college of Pharmacy
3. Three (3) letters of recommendation
4. Letter of Intent stating:
 - a. Desire to apply to the Residency Program at the VA Boston Healthcare System.
 - b. Program(s) that the applicant is interested in applying for: Ambulatory Care or Acute Care (applicants may apply for both).
 - c. The names and titles of three references from whom letters will be sent to the below address.
 - d. Understanding of the requirement to forward a certified transcript from the college of pharmacy attended.
 - e. A brief statement of the applicant's short and long term goals as well as why he/she is applying to the VA Boston Healthcare System.

All application materials must be received by January 2.

Interviewing Process:

- A. Applicants invited to interview will do so in person before February 28.
- B. Candidates will be interviewed by the:
 - 1. Residency Program Director
 - 2. Clinical Pharmacy Manager
 - 3. All available preceptors
- C. All candidates will be required to give a twelve minute presentation during their interview. This presentation can be on a topic of the candidate's choice.
- D. The applicants will be independently rated using standardized criteria
- E. Selection will be made by a committee consisting of the Program Director, Chief of Pharmacy Service and all preceptors.
