

# Do You Take Medicine For Stomach Acid? Should You Stop Taking Your Proton Pump Inhibitor (PPI)?

## Why should I stop or reduce the dose of my proton pump inhibitor (PPI)? (e.g., Lansoprazole, Omeprazole, Pantoprazole)

**Proton Pump Inhibitors (PPIs)** have been associated with serious harms, such as:

- + Infections, such as pneumonia and C. *difficile* diarrhea
- + Injury to the kidney and reduced kidney function
- + Iron, calcium, magnesium, and vitamin B levels can be reduced
- + Increased risk of broken bones

It is common to take these medicines longer than they are needed. If you have symptoms from stomach acid, do they happen every day or less often? If symptoms do not happen every day, you may only have to take a medicine when you need it. There are other medicines that help treat stomach acid symptoms in a matter of minutes to an hour or two. These include Famotidine, and other antacids.

If your symptoms worsen after taking Famotidine or other antacid, contact your provider.

### Plan for managing stomach acid symptoms

#### Lifestyle Changes:

Lose weight, if overweight or recent weight gain.

Avoid alcohol and stop using nicotine products.

Elevate the head of the bed.

Avoid foods that can trigger symptoms, such as caffeine, chocolate, or spicy foods.

**Avoid going to bed within 2 to 3 hours of eating**, especially fatty meals.

## SLOWLY taper then **STOP** your PPI:

**Famotidine (generics, Pepcid):** 10–20mg twice daily, as needed for stomach and symptoms
